PURPOSE:

- 1. To increase patient safety by eliminating the use of unsafe acronyms, symbols, and abbreviations that are frequently misinterpreted in prescriptions, medical records, and communications.
- 2. To ensure that clinical information is clearly understood by all healthcare providers, reduces misinterpretation in written or verbal communication.
- 3. To promote Standardization and outlines the role of regulatory bodies like the Joint Commission, National Patient Safety Goals, local health authorities, and accreditation bodies in ensuring safety standards.

DEFINITIONS:

"DO NOT USE" MEDICAL ABBREVIATIONS – A list of acronyms, symbols, and dosage designations that are thought to be prone to errors and ought to be avoided in medical records in order to avoid misunderstandings and possible patient injury.

RESPONSIBILITY: Staff Nurse, Pharmacist, Attending Physician, Resident On-Duty and Consultants

POLICY:

- 1. This policy shall applies to all handwritten, electronic, and pre-printed documentation including:
 - 1.1. Medication orders
 - 1.2. Progress notes
 - 1.3. Treatment plans
 - 1.4. Discharge summaries
 - 1.5. Electronic health record entries
 - 1.6. Verbal or telephone orders (shall be transcribed correctly)
- 2. Healthcare providers shall not use abbreviations, acronyms, or symbols on the **Do Not Use List** when documenting in medical records, writing orders, or communicating clinical information.
- 3. Only approved abbreviations listed in the organization's standardized medical abbreviation guide shall be used.
- 4. All clinical communications shall be written clearly and without the use of non-standard or prohibited abbreviations, to prevent misinterpretation that could lead to diagnostic, treatment, or medication errors.
